



Welcome to the West Gippsland catchment



Discover the 8 catchment zones we work across to improve the rivers, estuaries, lakes, inlets and wetlands.

1. Bunurong Coastal

On Bunurong Country, rivers run through farmland to meet the rugged Bass Strait coast. Communities are passionately working to enhance their patch and care for threatened species like Hooded Plovers.

* Visit Kegerungnongme/Powlett River and Yallock-Bellak Marine and Coastal Park

2. Wilsons Promontory

On the southern-most tip of mainland Australia, this is a precious haven for biodiversity. It is home to over 20% of Victoria's native plants and half the state's bird species.

* Visit Derby and Tidal Rivers in Wilsons Promontory National Park

3. Corner Inlet & Nooramunga

This world renowned Ramsar wetland is crucial for the survival of seagrass, mangroves, fish and migratory birds. Enhancing water quality along the rivers that flow into the inlet is key.

* Visit Corner Inlet bird hide Agnes Falls and Sillocks Hill lookout

4. Strzelecki

This range features ancient rainforests home to threatened plants and animals including Gippsland koalas. The lower foothills provide rich farmland where locals are working together to restore rivers and improve water quality.

* Visit Tanna Bulga National Park

5. Latrobe Durt'Yowan

Decades of coal mining/power generation have impacted the river's health but we're working with the community to revive the river and keep it alive and flowing.

* Visit Blue Rock lake

6. Great Dividing Range and foothills

The mountains are where our rivers begin. Headwaters support waterfalls, precious peatlands, lyrebirds and pygmy possums. We are working to protect peatlands and remove willows to keep these areas pristine.

* Visit Mt Baw Baw, Toorong Falls and Noojee

7. Gippsland Lakes and Hinterland

Three rivers of Carran Carran (Thomson), Durt'Yowan (Latrobe) and Wirn wirndook Yeerung (Maccolister) meet to flow through wetlands and into the Gippsland Lakes Ramsar site at Lake Wellington. These rivers are supported by water for the environment and fishways so fish can migrate and breed.


* Visit the Lower Latrobe Wetlands and Heyfield Wetlands

8. Gippsland Plains

Merriman Creek flows east from the Strzelecki Hills and out to sea near Seaspray. The estuary is ever changing and has significant natural values and deep cultural significance. 90 Mile Beach stretches east separating Gippsland Lakes from Bass Strait.

* Visit Merriman Creek estuary, Woodside and 90 Mile Beach


Fishways at Horseshoe Bend and Cowwarr Weir reconnect rivers helping native fish to survive by completing their migration along rivers and out to sea.

Corner Inlet Ramsar Wetland

This unique system of barrier islands and tidal mudflats has the most southerly population of White Mangrove in the world and largest area of broad-leaved seagrass in Victoria. It is a feeding, nesting and breeding area for thousands of resident and migratory birds. The inlet is fed by fresh water from the Franklin and Agnes rivers and creeks.



Lower Latrobe Wetlands

On the western edge of the Gippsland Lakes Ramsar site, these important wetlands filter water as it enters Lake Wellington and are home to precious wildlife.
